Replacing Weapons with Words and Other Thoughts on Civic Engagement

Melissa Wade, Director of Forensics and Barkley Forum Director

Melissa Wade is a national leader in the development of urban debate leagues. She founded the Atlanta Urban Debate League—a partnership between the Barkley Forum and Atlanta Public Schools—in 1985 and has spent the last 22 years introducing debate to inner-city high schools across the country. The Urban Debate League concept replaces physical aggression with verbal mastery: If children can command attention with powerful words, they do not have to resort to physical force to grab that attention. Dr. Bradd Shore, Goodrich C. White Professor of Anthropology and Director,

Emory Center on Myth and Ritual in American Life

When we look back on our childhood years and remember the shape of our childhood, we rely on a special form of autobiographical memory—Family Memory. Family Memory comprises our memories that rely on the rituals and routines of our family life. These are

the kinds of memories we have in mind when we say, "When we were kids we used to . . ." Family Memory is an important dimension of our identities. But where do these memories come from? Anthropologist Bradd Shore describes the negotiation by families of their Family Memories in ordinary family conversations.
